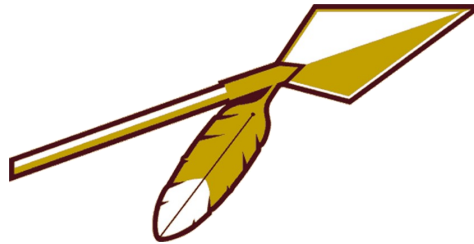

THE CAMP

Catching fish, popping balloons, paddling canoes, scaling walls –if this sounds like fun to you, plan to join us at the 10th annual Family Outdoor Skills Camp for the Hearing Impaired.

Under the guidance and supervision of experienced staff and volunteers, campers gain hands-on skills they'll use for a lifetime of fun in the outdoors. Campers don't need to bring any special equipment with them. All equipment is provided at the camp.

Donations from sponsoring organizations, such as the United Bowhunters of Missouri, Compton Traditional Bowhunters, Boy Scouts of America and several others, help to defray the cost of the programs, meals and other supplies needed to make the camp successful.

Parents and siblings of the deaf or hard of hearing child are encouraged to attend, too, making it a whole-family experience. The entire camp – food, lodging and fun – is a real bargain...**it's free!**



THE FACILITIES

H. Roe Bartle Boy Scout Reservation is located on Truman Lake near Osceola, Mo.,. Facilities include family cabins, which do have electricity, but no air conditioning. There are bathrooms and showers available, as well. A group dining hall provides the area where all the meals are served.

THE ACTIVITIES

THE CLIMBING WALL

Participants reach new heights as they learn to scale a 40-foot climbing tower. Campers gain confidence and learn problem-solving skills, as climbing the tower is harder than it looks. However, many of the campers scale it like they are Spiderman!



SHOOTING SPORTS

After a short safety lesson and then under the watchful eyes of conservation agents campers fire pellet guns at clay targets. Most take home broken clays as souvenirs. Campers also participate in trap shooting.



CANOERING

When you go canoeing, there's always the risk of getting wet! Instructors teach campers basic paddling techniques and how to enter and exit without tipping the canoes.

ARCHERY



Instructors from the United Bowhunters of Missouri and Compton Traditional Bowhunters introduce campers to traditional archery. After hitting the bull's eye a few times, most campers are addicted.

FISHING

Anglers enjoy showing off their newly-learned skills. Most campers end up hooked on fishing and leave having caught at least one fish over the weekend.
